TREE CARE: PRUNING EASTMORELAND TREE COMMITTEE



Proper pruning of your street trees ensures they have greater health, vigor, and beauty and are better able to provide a multitude of benefits to you and the community for the long-term.


Pruning should begin when the tree is young so that pruning wounds can heal quickly. The city does not require a city-issued pruning permit for removing small branches **up to** ½" **diameter**. However, branches **over** ½" **diameter** require a city-issued pruning permit and we recommend hiring certified arborists for large branch and large tree pruning.



PRUNING GUIDELINES

3-5 years after planting, you can begin pruning.

- To avoid suckering and promote faster healing, always prune a branch where it joins a larger branch or the main stem (see photo above).
- To prevent bark from tearing when cutting, branches **over** ½" **diameter** often need a three-cut method (diagram below) where you partially undercut the branch about a foot from the trunk (cut 1), then make cuts 2 and 3.



Three-Cut Method

- Remove root suckers.
- Remove dead, rubbing, and crossing branches.



• If two (or more) upward-growing branches are co-dominant leaders, remove all but one.



• An important rule of thumb is to **not remove more than ¼ of the live crown** when pruning.

6 + years after planting, contact the Tree Committee (eastmoreland.tree@gmail.com) or a certified arborist to inspect your tree to determine what pruning is necessary. Certified arborists use the ANSII standards¹ for pruning. The same general guidelines are followed for pruning older trees as for younger trees.
